

Patti's Ponderings

"The whole earth is a living icon of the face of God." -St. John of Damascus (675-749)

Icons are a long-standing tradition in the Christian church. In the eyes of the Eastern Orthodox church, icons are windows to heaven which help us connect with God. Traditionally icons are elaborate paintings full of symbolism, usually a representation of Christ or other religious figures. St. John defended the use of icons in worship. (The opposition claimed icons were idols and forbidden in the 10 commandments.) He valued the use of icons to aid us in conceptualizing God. He extended the idea of icons beyond paintings. In his writings, as quoted above, he asserted "the whole earth is a living icon of the face of God." The psalmist who wrote Psalm 19 would agree; "The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands." Psalm 19:1. How do you see God in creation?

In Les Misérables, the main character sings out, "To love another person is to see the face of God." Sometimes we see God in acts of compassion and kindness, in our love for others. A few weeks ago, my daughter was babysitting my grandson, Samuel. She took Samuel to work with her in a senior living care center. One woman, in the throes of dementia said aloud, "I've never seen God so small

before." How do you see God in the faces and loving actions of people?

Wherever life takes us, when we keep our eyes open, we can see the face of God all around us. Let's keep our eyes open this summer to the variety of ways God is revealed to us.

Beginning June 16, I will be on renewal leave. I will be relaxing by a pool reading, spending time with family, and digging deep into Celtic Spirituality. I will conclude my time on a pilgrimage to Inishmore, an ancient site of Celtic Christianity in Ireland. I will return August 1. Why June Pride Matters

In 1933, when the Nazi political party came into power in Germany, the city of Berlin was the center of gay culture.

After the election and take over by the newly elected party, clubs, organizations and publications related to gay culture were shut down. Books, art and anything dealing with gay culture was burned, banned and denounced as immoral.

Revision of Paragraph 175 of German law made it easier to bring criminal charges for homosexual acts leading to large increases in arrests and convictions. The goal was simple, to eliminate all manifestation of homosexuality in Germany.

Between 1933 and 1945 an estimated 100,000 men were arrested as homosexuals. The number of gay men who died in concentration camps is not fully known, but the marking of men with pink triangles became well known during this time. (Article from Wikipedia Revised May 18, 2025.)

In the United States, executive order 10450 by President Ike Eisenhower in 1953, along with pressure from Senator Joseph McCarthy, led to the mass firings of an estimated 10,000 government workers who identified as gay or lesbian. (Article from the National Park Service)

The United Methodist Church has also had an internal struggle over the issue of homosexuality which has led many individuals and churches to leave our denomination.

In Colorado, the passage of Amendment 2 in 1992, prohibited the state from enacting anti-discrimination protections for gay, lesbian and bisexual individuals. While this amendment was later struck down by the United States Supreme Court in 1996, the passage of Amendment 2 sent a wave of debate across the country.

Now, fast forward to 2024, where Colorado voters passed Amendment J, which removed the ban on same-sex marriage from the state constitution. (Ref Google)

So... the battle is over... Right? or Wrong?

Just recently, a group of conservative MAGA pastors in Colorado have been preaching sermon series on how the new state law prohibits them from speaking out against the transgender community as well as how inclusion of the LGBTQI+ community will be the undoing of the moral fabric the state of Colorado. Much of what is being preached by these pastors is based out of fear and fanning the flames of homophobia focusing on the transgender community.

The truth of the matter is that Amendment J does not force churches or any pastors to marry gay couples or include people who are LGBTQI+ or transgender... It also doesn't ban preachers from talking about transgender issues in a derogatory way.

But I wish it did...

As a reconciling congregation, Smoky Hill UMC took the huge step to say, hate, bigotry and prejudice are not welcome here.

One of the reasons that I am the associate pastor at Smoky Hill UMC is because this church has made a commitment to overcoming all forms of racial and social injustice... but I'm not here just to do ministry to the LGBTQI+ community. I'm here for all. Always remember that the + in LGBTQI+ is for you... as an advocate or someone who is straight that has friends and family in the community.

On Sunday, June 1st, I'd like to share with you a personal story about my family, and I hope it will change the way everyone thinks and feels about all families as well as the transgender and LGBTQI+ community.

The celebration of families and Pride will continue all month as we show pictures and celebrate the lives of all families that are part of Smoky Hill UMC.

I hope you will join us.

COLORADO VILLAGE COLLABORATIVE

CVC has secured a grant to improve their Safe Open Space. Palette homes, supporting 2 residents, will replace tents and expanded electricity is also planned. The rules are still the same, as they apply to expectations for the residents. A social worker needs to approve applicants and strict site rules are in place. The location where we take donations is in the parking lot of Denver Human Services. Residents can have access to services such as legal information and social workers. They are grateful for our donations. Needs change and currently they need mostly men's clothing in medium and large clothing, but not extra large. They also need kitchen items, gently used, to be given to those residents who have obtained jobs and have a furnished apartment. Bedding and towels were recently donated and can be used on site and in the new apartments. Supports continue for a brief time as they transition out. Recently there have been several who have transitioned. If you are doing spring cleaning, please remember CVC and the bin downstairs across from the elevator. Thank you to all of you who have contributed to the "hand up" purpose of Colorado Village Collaborative.

The 74th General Assembly, 2024 session has ended with many bills on the governor's desk awaiting his signature to become law. Three bills that have garnered public attention after devastating occurrences in the funeral home industry in Colorado. These have been signed into law recently by Governor Polis. Colorado previously has been the only state that didn't require certification for funeral home directors. Other bills are awaiting the governor's signature are bills strengthening enforcement of human trafficking, several bills giving expanded rights to foster children, environmental protections and many more. RACIAL JUSTICE TASK FORCE

Finding My True Self: A Late Bloomer's Journey of Faith and Identity

At this point in my life, I identify as queer.

In the LGBTQIA+ community, people like me are sometimes called "late bloomers" — those who come to understand their queerness later in life. For me, that realization came about a year and a half ago, when I was 40.

You might be wondering: *How does that happen? How can someone not realize something so important for 40 years?*

Many people grow up in environments where queerness isn't visible, named, or even imagined. So, like many others, I dated men and figured that was just how life worked.

I grew up in Colorado Springs, surrounded by a fairly conservative environment shaped by purity culture. I didn't have queer friends, family members, or even role models nearby — so it never occurred to me that queerness was even an option. This is what we call heteronormativity — the assumption that everyone is straight.

In 2020, things began to shift. I found myself on TikTok, following creators whose lives and perspectives were really different from what I knew. I also started listening to podcasts about faith, justice, and allyship — and through all of that, I began to connect with queer voices as well.

At the same time, I was doing a lot of personal work — digging deep into my own beliefs and becoming more honest and open about who I am, both as a Christian and as a woman. I was lucky to meet some wonderful people at just the right time, and they helped me grow into the person I am today.

Slowly but surely, I came to realize something important and true: I am attracted to women. And when that clicked, it felt more real and right than anything I'd ever known.

Not long after that, I found my way to Smoky Hill UMC. Like many of you, I was drawn by this church's deep commitment to social justice. I joined the Rainbow Alliance and the Racial Justice Task Force, and over the past year, my faith and my sense of self have continued to grow and flourish in this community. I feel the SHUMC community supports me in my journey. If you are also on a journey to delf-discovery, know that you are not alone. The journey doesn't have to be quick, and it doesn't have to be loud. It just has to be yours.

I'm so grateful to be on this journey, and to share it with all of you.

So, what does it mean — and why has it changed?

Honestly, I had to look it up myself, too!

2SLGBTQIA+ stands for **Two-Spirit**, **Lesbian**, **Gay**, **Bisexual**, **Transgender**, **Queer/Questioning**, **Intersex**, **Asexual**, and the "+" acknowledges the many other identities and ways people choose to self-identify.

You may also notice that 2S (Two-Spirit) comes first. This honors Indigenous peoples and reminds us that we live on Indigenous land.
